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
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## The Facts About Breast Cancer and Mammograms

It provides information on a woman's risk for breast cancer, the National Cancer Institute's recommendations a out mammograms, and the benefits and limitations of the procedure.

A fter skin cancer, breast cancer is the most frequently diagnosed cancer in women in the U nited S tates. It is second only to lung cancer in cancer-related deaths. A pproximately 180,000 new cases of breast cancer are estimated for 1997, and about 44,000 women are expected to die from the disease.
